Palmetto Care Connections (PCC) had another amazing year in 2016! We are so fortunate to have the continued support and commitment from our Board of Directors as well as our Advisory Council as our team has worked diligently to improve access to quality health care services in our rural/underserved communities across the state. Over the past year, telehealth has continued to grow in South Carolina and we have been blessed to work with so many great individuals and organizations who truly have the best interest of our citizens in mind.

The PCC team believes that...the physical address of a person should NOT define the quality of life that he/she is able to live! Through many partnerships and collaborations, the citizens of South Carolina can rest a little easier knowing that 96% of our state's population is within 60 minutes of expert stroke care. We must however continue to align our resources such that we don't rest until South Carolina has achieved 100%!

Although we have made tremendous strides in expanding telehealth in our state, never doubt there continues to be a lot of work ahead of us. According to a report published by MarketsandMarkets, the telehealth business in 2016 was valued at \$2.78 billion and is projected to reach \$9.35 billion by 2021! It seems that telemedicine was the top regulatory issue in 2016, according to a survey conducted by the Federation of State Medical Boards.



Partnering with the South Carolina <u>Telehealth Alliance</u> (SCTA)

STRATEGY 1: Deploy a Coordinated, Open Access telehealth network in South Carolina Palmetto Care Connections (PCC) formed a Centralized Credentialing Workgroup that consisted of Directors/VPs of Medical Staff Services from all of the Telehealth Hub providers – Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC), Greenville Health System, McLeod, Palmetto Health and the SC Department of Mental Health.

The workgroup designed a preliminary model of what a statewide centralized credentialing program for all of the telehealth providers in SC might look like. PCC/MUSC presented this model to Medical Staff managers of Hospitals across SC at the SC Association of Medical Staff Services to gain their interest for such a model and to gather their ideas. PCC then designed a Survey regarding how a statewide model may look and it was sent out to all hospitals in SC. Results from this survey will be shared with the Workgroup in early 2017 and with this data, a formal Statewide Centralized Credentialing model will be proposed.

STRATEGY 2: Understand and effectively respond to the needs of users of telehealth with an emphasis on the rural/underserved

- •Established service development priorities based on the 2015 needs assessment of the four county area of Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell and Hampton.
- Provided support and training to rural healthcare providers in counties of Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, and Hampton.
- •Consulted with South Carolina Free Clinic Association to incorporate telehealth services into their clinics.

STRATEGY 4: Conduct
Statewide education, training
and promotion to providers
and the public to accelerate and
spread adoption of telehealth.

With the assistance of the Education Committee with members representing PCC, USC School of Medicine, SCTA, AHEC, SCDHHS, this group accomplished several initiatives including: $\frac{1}{2}$

- •Coordinated the Poster Session for The 5th Annual Telehealth Summit. The poster session places a focus on the research component of telehealth. With the assistance of this committee,the poster session grew from a total of 7 at the 4th Annual Telehealth Summit to a total of 22 for the 2016 Summit. This is a tremendous growth spurt that took a lot of effort by this committee.
- •Responsible for sending out the Requests for Proposals for the 6 Breakout sessions at the Telehealth Summit. Through hard work, the Education Committee was able to identify 6 key breakout sessions for the Telehealth Summit.
- •Coordinated the 1st Pediatric Grand Rounds in South Carolina
- Partnered with Star Telehealth to offer online telehealth certifications on PCC website
 Certified Telemedicine Clinical Presenter and Technical Professional
 Certified Telehealth Coordinator and Technical Presenter
 Certified Telemedicine Clinical Presenter for Telestroke



Chief Executive Officer "Approximately, a year ago Family Health Centers (FHC), Inc. embarked on an ambitious goal to redesign and implement a brand new state-of-the-art network infrastructure which would improve network response time, agility, efficiency, reliability, availability, security, and support for better collaborations of applications between customers and other health care providers. Funding for these initiatives was provided via the Universal Services Administrative Company (USAC). Special thanks to Matt and Kathy for making the process of accessing these funds seamless. PCC handled all the paperwork requirements and ensured that all the regulatory requirements were met. Finally, once the infrastructure was put in place, PCC was instrumental in helping us implement our current Telehealth initiative by providing equipment and facilitating support with the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) to provide specialist services to our patients via telehealth.

Thanks PCC, for all that you do. I look forward to continue working with you on other initiatives."

Partnership with Health Connect Network, a Broadband Consortium based in Maine

Palmetto Care Connections (PCC) has developed a partnership with a large Broadband Consortium, Health Connect Network, located in Bangor, Maine. This partnership will allow PCC to provide additional benefits to the PSPN members. When PSPN was started back in 2009 with the leadership of MUSC, Spirit was awarded a 10 year Evergreen contract. This means that PCC is able to assist health care providers in obtaining the FCC's 65% subsidy if and only if they use Spirit as their carrier. Although the contract with Spirit has helped many health care providers in South Carolina, it does place limitations on working with providers who are in existing contracts with other carriers, such as AT&T, Time Warner, Frontier, etc. For each non-Spirit circuit that PCC tries to qualify under PSPN, a new RFP must be approved by USAC and distributed to the public. Along with a new RFP, a very detailed network design must also be submitted for each individual circuit. This process is very labor intense and will be difficult for PCC to tackle on its own with current staffing. Through this new partnership with HCN, PCC will now be able to offer these services to any eligible health care provider in SC and neighboring states. HCN will be responsible for paperwork on the back end including all RFPs and network designs. HCN will also be responsible for billing the site and USAC for the full 100% of the total cost. PCC will continue to market the PSPN Consortium and identify health care providers that are eligible for the USAC subsidy and HCN will provide the bulk of the administrative work for these providers. PCC and HCN will split any fees received as a result of this new partnership. This partnership will also allow PCC a three year time period in which to learn how to conduct these new tasks and eventually have the capacity to bring it back in-house. Conservative estimates for this partnership show that PCC could possibly net anywhere from \$60,000/year to more than \$100,000/year. Besides financially helping PCC, this partnership will bring tremendous value/benefit to the health care providers in South Carolina.

Contract with SCORH to Expand Telehealth Services in the Rural Communities in SC and Expand PSPN Consortium

Palmetto Care Connections (PCC) entered into a contract with SC Office of Rural Health (SCORH) in June 2016 for the purpose of:

- •Educating rural health care providers on the benefits, efficiencies and value achieved from incorporating telehealth into their day to day operations as a means to increase access to care for rural patients. Such activities may include training on the use of telehealth technologies as assessing usage patterns and needs.
- •Educating rural health care providers on the benefits and value of becoming a member of a HIPAA compli ant, statewide broadband consortium comprised of only health care organizations. Such activities might include the development of policies and procedures for telehealth services, reimbursement guidance and implementation assistance
- •Educating administration, school nurses, faculty and parents at South Carolina schools (K-12) on benefit/value of adding telehealth as a service for their students to improve access to primary care services, reduce absenteeism. And reduce unnecessary emergency department visits
- •Promote use of telehealth services in the SCORH weekly e-newsletter and annual conference
- •Provide marketing expertise for the purpose of promoting telehealth and the need for dedicated band width

PCC satisfactorily met the objectives given by SCORH from June 2016-December 2016. The financial revenues from this contract have netted PCC approximately \$95,000 through the third quarter of 2016 with an expected additional \$70,000 to be paid in February 2017 for services rendered in the last quarter of 2016. This contract will continue in 2017 with projected increased revenues!



TECHNOLOGY



Palmetto Health received a USDA grant which allows them to partner with Richland School District I for the purpose of developing a telehealth pilot program in 4 schools in Lower Richland County, South Carolina to provide educational services to residents in the communities. Residents in these target areas face health care shortages and experience high rates of chronic disease yet have fewer resources, such as income and insurance in order to obtain care and improve their health. Palmetto Health has determined that with such diseases as Obesity and Diabetes being prevalent in these communities, these chronic disease related co-morbidities can be mitigated and sometimes significantly reduced in individuals with proper self-management. Palmetto Health's proven programs and services will be delivered in the heart of these rural communities through the schools. Palmetto Health will also provide health care services to these schools. Palmetto Health has contracted with Palmetto Care Connections for technical support for this program.

PCC will provide the following support services:

- Coordinate equipment installation at the schools
- Coordinate equipment installation for this project at Palmetto Health
- Provide on-site training
- Schedule quarterly site visits to ensure proper functionality
- Coordinate monthly check-in calls for participants



TECHNOLOGY



Palmetto Care Connections is responsible for installing, configuring and providing support and maintenance to all of the Behavioral Health Service Centers in the state which total 32 locations. Through the PSPN infrastructure and a specific provisioning server from Polycom, Palmetto Care Connections will be able to provide remote support to all of these locations.

TECHNOLOGY



The Florence County Commission on Alcohol & Drug Abuse Center dba Circle Park Behavioral Health Services, was awarded a 2016 USDA Distance Learning & Telemedicine Grant in the amount of \$155,926 for the purpose of creating a telehealth network among all of the Behavioral Health Service Sites (formerly called SC Department of Alcohol and other Drug Abuse Substances Service Centers) locations in an effort to improve efficiencies. The funding will allow for two way videoconferencing equipment to be placed at each location as well upgrades in capacity for scheduling and bridging capabilities through their partnership with the Palmetto State providers network (PSPN). SCTA committed to a \$162,292 match to bring the grant total to \$318,218. This commitment of more than 100% made this grant application very competitive. PCC assisted in the planning and development of this grant application. PCC is also responsible for deploying and configuring all of the telehealth carts as well as train the staff at each DAODAS site on how to use the technology. Once the telehealth equipment has been installed and all DAODAS sites are connected, PCC will provide maintenance and support to the each location on an ongoing basis. PCC will be reimbursed \$36,000 for these services through the grant. These funds will be used to hire additional technical assistance and for travel costs.

Submitted the 2017 ORHP Network Development Grant for the purpose of connecting the 23 rural offices of the South Carolina Behavioral Health Service Sites (BHS) with primary care providers in a variety of settings for the provision of substance abuse treatment, mental health services, and primary care and also connecting them to the schools. We will look to achieve efficiencies through the integration of behavioral health in the primary care setting and the integration of primary care into behavioral health settings. Through these telehealth services, PCC and BHS look to reduce opioid addiction in SC and improve mental health services which will create a positive change in population health. This grant will provide \$300,000/year for 3 years.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT



Palmetto Care Connections works with Low Country Area Health Education Consortium (LCAHEC) and the Carolina Centers for Medical Education (CCME) to offer a tele-diabetic education program that is available in Fairfax and Barnwell counties at the federally qualified health center, Low Country Health Care System.

Tele-Diabetic Education Program

- 82 people referred to our DSME classes since April
- 60 of these attended at least 1 class
- **50** of these graduated with 4+ classes attended
- Graduation Rate 61%

"Having the opportunity to provide Diabetes Self-Management Education (DSME) classes to more areas of South Carolina has been very positive for me as the instructor and for those participating in the classes. Without the DSME classes via Telehealth, I would not have been able to provide this service to the rural areas of the state. All of the participants have stated that they would recommend this format to others in need of the education for diabetes or prediabetes. The participants are able to attend classes in their communities, thus, saving them time and expense. This has also saved me many hours of driving time and travel expense going to the distance sites."



PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT



Palmetto Care Connections was awarded a 2016 USDA Distance Learning & Telemedicine Grant for the purpose of connecting 19 schools in Allendale, Bamberg and Barnwell counties with their local health care providers (Awardees listed to the right). Healthcare providers at Bamberg Family Practice (a rural health clinic) will serve all of the schools in Bamberg County while Low Country Health Care System (a FQHC) will serve all schools in Barnwell and Allendale counties. MUSC will serve as the back-up provider for all of these schools. PCC will utilize the proven school based telehealth model currently utilized by MUSC when connecting with other schools across the state. SCTA committed to a \$158,215 match to bring the grant total to \$316,004. This commitment of more than 100% made this grant application very competitive.

South Carolina Office of Rural Health



Palmetto Care Connections (PCC) partnered with the South Carolina Office of Rural Health to implement the Veterans Affairs Flex Grant. PCC will receive \$40,000 for its assistance with the implementation of this program. South Carolina ranks 7th in the nation for its Veteran to civilian population rate of 8.53%, and the VA's capacity to provide timely outpatient primary health care to SC's Veterans has been outpaced by the significant growth and need of its Veteran population in the state especially in rural communities. Rural Veterans face additional barriers based on proximity to appropriate behavioral health care services within the VA system and their current need for behavioral health care provision mirrors, and in many cases, surpasses the unmet needs of rural non-Veterans. Veterans in SC have a high incidence of reported behavioral/mental health conditions. Data from the 2012 National Council for Behavioral Health report states that of the 48,556 SC Veterans from eithe Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) or Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF), close to 9,000 were diagnosed with PTSD and Major Depression, while another 4,222 were projected as being "unserved" for these care needs. The need for behavioral healthcare diagnoses and services within this population continues to be critical, especially relative to the treatment needs for PTSD and other "signature injuries" experienced by Veterans. The focus of the project will be to improve access to those rural Veterans who have a primary care medical home and established relationship with a rural primary care provider in a non-VA setting. The vehicle within the non-VA care realm to connect Veterans' care reimbursement at the Medicare rate will be provider enrollment in the Veterans Choice program. Sc RAVHR will impact rural Veterans' behavioral health care access, coordination and delivery state-wide with a total impact of 10% of those 4,222 Veterans meeting the "unserved" criteria for PTSD. Therefore through SC RAVHR 422 rural Veterans will be evaluated for PTSD or PT

PCC worked with the SC Department of Mental Health and the SCTA in 2016 to expand the DMH Tele-psychiatry program into additional rural hospitals. PCC assisted in the contract negotiations between DMH and SCTA in 2016. In the end it was determined that SCTA would purchase telehealth carts to be placed in the emergency departments at 7 rural hospitals who have never utilized this service before which means greater access to care for residents in the communities of Newberry, Allendale, Edgefield, Lake City, Lancaster, Pickens and Greer. SCTA agreed to pay the salary for 1 additional Psychiatrist to serve on the DMH staff and support the additional hospitals utilizing this service as well as assist in paying the annual DMH charges for providing these services.

TELEPSYCHIATRY OUTCOMES

53% Reduction in Emergency Departments (ED) Lengths of Stay (LOS), per USC School of Medicine

CY 2015: 31% of Patients Recommended for Release (Discharge) Same Day of Consultation

Telepsychiatry patients had **lower rates** of inpatient admission after 30 days (8% vs 19%)

Telepsychiatry patients had **shorter lengths** of stay (4.1 days vs 6.2 days inpatient)

Telepsychiatry patients were *less likely* to be admitted to the hospital (8% vs 16%)

Telepsychiatry patients were **more likely** to receive 30 days followup care (38% vs 13%)

Telepsychiatry patients were more likely to received 90 day followup care (46% vs 17%)

Inpatient hospital charge savings (\$5209 vs \$8529) =\$3320

TELEHEALTH REIMBURSEMENT

Palmetto Care Connections partnered with the South Carolina Telehealth Alliance to develop the first Payer Workgroup in South Carolina. Palmetto Care Connections participated in the SCTA Payer Workgroup discussion about expanding telehealth reimbursements. Payers, providers and other health care organizations were represented to discuss future telehealth reimbursement opportunities and best practices for achieving them.

Initial Payer Recommendations:

- Private Payers: Mirror SC DHHS Medicaid's coverage of schools as a covered site by adding schools as a covered place of service in telehealth policies
- All: Expand the list of eligible, reimbursable provides to include nurse practitioners, clinical psychologist and registered dieticians
- Medicaid: Increase the facility fee reimbursement to a more equitable amount
- Medicare: Prevent geographical barriers in telehealth insurance coverage
